Dr. Stobo graduated medical school at the State University of New York in Buffalo in 1968. He then completed two years of training on the Osler Medical Service at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, two years as a research associate at the National Institutes of Health, and one year as chief medical resident on the Osler Medical Service at Johns Hopkins. Dr. Stobo went on to be an assistant professor for three years at the Department of Immunology at the Mayo Clinic. From 1976 to 1985, he

served as head of the Section of Rheumatology and Clinical Immunology at the University of California, San Francisco where he was also an investigator with the Howard Hughes Medical Institute. In 1985, he returned to Johns Hopkins as the William Osler Professor of Medicine and Physician-in-Chief of the Johns Hopkins Hospital. In 1996, Dr. Stobo received a mastership from the American College of Physicians for his distinguished contributions to internal medicine. In 1997, Dr. Stobo became the President of The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

Dr. Stobo's leadership roles in national organizations have included President of the American Association of Professors of Medicine, President of the American College of Rheumatology, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the American Board of Internal Medicine, Chairman of the American Board of Internal Medicine's Board of Trustees Foundation. He has been a member of the Institute of Medicine and IOM Council, the Texas Environmental Research Consortium, Governor's Council on Science and Biotechnology Development, Institute of Medicine Committee on Science, Engineering, and Public Policy (COSEPUP), and The Academy of Medicine, Engineering and Science of Texas (TAMEST).

He also serves as Vice Chair for the Committee on Medical Indigent Care in Texas and a member, Institute of Medicine Committee to Study the Listing of Impairments and Agency Access to Medical Expertise in the Social Security Disability Determination Process
